<p>This two-story residence has a complex plan that rests on a poured concrete foundation. Its cross gable roof and sloped entry hood are covered in composition shingles. Exterior walls are clad in lap siding and windows are primarily wood 1/1 double-hung. Decorative features include the cut-away with windows in the central bay on the first floor. Alterations include the conversion into a multi-unit residence, the front steps and hand rail, and the entry door on the upper floor.</p>
