


McLoughlin Boulevard Enhancements



The City of Oregon City (City) and the Oregon Department of Transportation want you to help us shape the future of McLoughlin Boulevard. We are engaging in the third phase of the McLoughlin Boulevard Enhancement Plan, which will evaluate several design options for a shared-use path on McLoughlin Boulevard (also known as OR99E) between 10th Street and tumwata village.

This first phase of the design process will look at how to create safe pedestrian and bike connections along the viaduct/river section of the highway. This important work will inform the design of the rest of the corridor in the project area.



Project benefits:



Safe access and improved facilities

The project aims to provide safe access and improved facilities for people who walk, access transit, and bike on McLoughlin Boulevard. Currently, it lacks bicycle access, sufficient sidewalks, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance, and separation from fast-moving traffic.



Revitalization

Improved facilities will help address the barriers to investing in and connecting people to downtown and the Willamette River. The selected design will help Oregon City realize its tourism, economic, and community development goals by creating a new focal point that restores and reprioritizes downtown's relationship with the Willamette River and links to current and future river access routes.



Project timeline:

The project started in mid-2023 and will evaluate options for a shared-use path. During the design phase, you can provide feedback on elements within the proposed alternatives during our virtual open house events, helping to prioritize a preferred shared-use path alternative. In late 2024, the City will select a preferred shared-use path alternative and present this design to the Oregon City Commission for adoption.
