








1 in 4 OC youth signed up for SRP in 2019 (up from 1 in 5 in 2018)

How Many Kids Finished the Summer Reading Program This Year?



- Did not finish Summer Reading (57% of sign ups)
- Turned in 1 or more reading logs (43% of sign ups)

Decrease in completion rates
(47% completion rate in 2018)



- Turned in 1 reading log (19% of finishers)
- Turned in 2 reading logs (54% of finishers)
- Turned in 3 reading logs (27% of finishers)

Increase in 2nd reading logs completed




What Grades Did Our Summer Readers Just Finish?

Summer Reading Sign Ups





Summer Reading Finishers




- I'm not in kindergarten yet (34% of finishers)

What Grades Did Our Summer Readers Just Finish?




Finishing rates down in all age groups compared to 2018






Year-Round Events



The Summer Reading Program "has totally ignited my son's love of reading."


What was your favorite thing about Summer Reading this year?

"My daughter loves turning in her completed reading log. She feels so accomplished."


What could we do differently next year to make Summer Reading even better?


Were the e-mail reminders helpful?

BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS

- A preschooler came in and asked for an Avengers book. When he looked at the book, he said "this will be my favorite."
- A kid very proudly said he liked all of my top picks for books similar to Dog Man (Chicken Squad, Bad Guys, Kung Pow Chicken, and Binky the Space Cat) and then read the entire Binky graphic novel before they even left.
- While helping a teen refill a bingo card after she forgot the original at home, I asked her what book a library staff member had recommended to her. She pulled Sabrina's recommendation, *The Wicked Deep* by Shea Ernshaw, out of her backpack. When I asked if she'd liked it, she said, "I read it five times."

PRIZES

- 3 siblings turned in their pink summer reading forms. The mom said that they took "My Father's Dragon" as one of the free books. She read it to the kids and everyone loved it!
- An older patron was excited she could get a pencil, eraser, and pencil sharpener over the course of the summer so she'd be ready to go once school started.
- After I told her the contents of the Finisher Packet with a Kid Finisher, her eyes widened and she said, "Thank you *SO* much!!!"

READING AT HOME

- A dad brought in his young Wiggle Worm to meet up with another little friend who was in the process of selecting his free book. I asked if he'd like to sign up and he looked uncertain--but before I could start to explain the program, another parent jumped in and started regaling him with the awesomeness of SRP and how beneficial it had been for her little one and how he should definitely sign up. He signed up.
- A family came in to turn in their first reading logs today and one of the kids (a wiggle worm) had loved her log so much (she had decorated it with stickers and markers) that she cut it up and used it in an art project!
- A mom and two kids came in at 6:55 last night to turn in their first reading log. They'd just finished filling in the last star and the kids begged to go to the library right then to get their prize. They rushed down here to make it before we closed and, in his excitement, one of the kids had completely forgotten his shoes at home.

THE LIBRARY

- Had a family walk up to me. Mom said that her daughter wanted to say something to me. The daughter gave me a thumbs up and said that she gave our library an A+ because it had so many books and fun things.
- A grandma who's been bringing her granddaughters to Art Lab and the Young Teen programs told me that her family & friends have been asking her what she does with her granddaughters when the kids go over to her house. Everyone is surprised that they go to the library so much, but according to grandma, "it's the only thing they want to do."
- This happened Thursday near the self-check machines as a family was leaving. The youngest, a little guy not much more than two, said, "Mama--Mama--this is awesome!"

Conclusion

Changes for Summer Reading 2020



More outreach to Head Start
(only 17 children signed up this year)

Continue Family Concerts with sponsorships from local businesses

Increase capacity for Young Teen programs to 30 youth per week

Include the "why" of our SRP offerings in monthly parent newsletter (in print and via e-mail)

Plan for a 25% increase in sign ups next year (750 Wiggle Worms, 1,500 Kids, 500 Teens)

Plan for a 50% completion rate and investigate why the completion rate dropped from 2018-19
