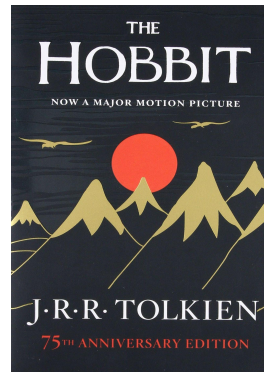
A Daily Dose Of Knowledge

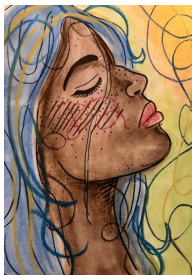

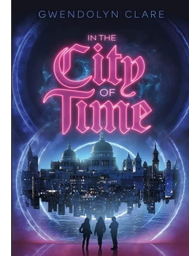

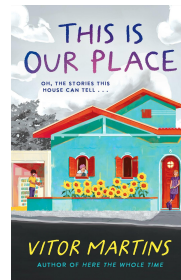
New Arrivals

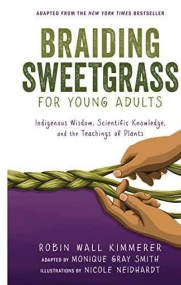


***This Is Our Place* by Vitor Martins**
