Cleanup and Enhancement Event Saturday, April 21

Participate in the 14th Annual Cleanup and Enhancement event scheduled for Saturday, April 21, from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Oregon City residents eager to begin spring-cleaning can report to Clackamette Park to obtain vouchers for the Metro South Transfer Station.

Vouchers will entitle Oregon City residents to dispose of household garbage and recyclable items April 21 through the 29th. Items for disposal may include, household hazardous waste, yard debris, scrap metal, tires, block foam (#6 only,) appliances and motorized equipment (e.g. refrigerators and mowers).

Del Bullock, event chairman said, "In order for people to get free disposal privileges they must obtain trip vouchers at Clackamette Park, 1955 Clackamette Drive, on Saturday, April 21. Then drive to the Metro South Transfer Station at 2001 Washington Street to empty their vehicles. This year participants will have until Sunday, April 29 to use their free trip vouchers to drop off their loads of garbage and debris. So it is a good time to do spring-cleaning. Each year the Cleanup and Enhancement Committee tries to make the cleanup day easier, and more efficient for Oregon City residents."

Enhancement projects will also take place on April 21st at parks throughout the city. Volunteers from SOLV and local neighborhood associations will pick up litter, clean public landscapes, pull ivy, and plant trees and shrubs. This year a unique project, to build worm bins for food waste at schools has been added.

Last year over 580 citizens took advantage of this successful event. In addition there were over 200 volunteers involved in beautifying the city. 
Bunny Hop 2001!



Need Something Fun to Read?

The library has several special resources to help you find just the right new mystery, western, sci-fi, romance, novel, or other work of fiction to read.

First are the on-line resources such as Novelist – an advisory database with over 90,000 titles covering fiction for all ages. You can use it either in the library or via our website (www.oregoncity.lib.or.us) then click on “Useful Databases”. You will need to have your library card handy because access requires your registration number.

The Internet is also a good resource. Amazon.com and Powells.com are good choices for recommendations based on their customer’s current favorites. They also feature recommendations for other books similar to the title you have inquired about.

Finally, the library also has notebooks at the reference desk full of lists of books in a wide range of subject areas. Keep in mind, librarians are readers too and can often suggest new authors for your consideration.

Home Power Added

Recently added to the list of magazine subscriptions at the library is “Home Power: The Hands on Journal of Home-Made Power”. This bi-monthly publication features numerous articles on the latest approaches to small-scale energy generation from such sources as solar, wind, and hydro. The latest issue (#81) features articles on hydronic cooling systems, straw bale house construction, problems observed with poorly designed and executed installations and recommendations for dealing with vendors.

As with nearly all of the library’s 200+ periodical subscriptions, the current copy is kept in the library with back issues available for loan.



From Your Storm and Wastewater Department

Just a reminder, please do not dump grass clippings and yard debris in any drainage ditches or neighborhood detention ponds. This could cause flooding problems should we get some good spring rain. Water Quality News

Do you have an irrigation system for your lawn, garden or landscaping? Irrigation systems certainly make watering lawns and gardens easier and save you time. However, they require special equipment to prevent contaminated water from siphoning back into home plumbing and the public water supply. Irrigation systems not protected by approved backflow prevention devices endanger the health of a household, neighborhood, and community.

All irrigation systems – new or existing – must be equipped with an Oregon Health Division-approved backflow prevention device. Only properly installed, state-approved backflow prevention devices meet plumbing code and provide protection for the health of your family and neighbors.

Three of the four types of backflow prevention devices require annual testing to make sure they are working properly. Now is an excellent time to schedule that annual backflow assembly test.

Mercury Thermometer Exchange

Now through Monday, April 30, 2001 you can exchange mercury-filled thermometers. These thermometers can poison lakes, contaminate fish and harm fetuses if not disposed of properly. Many local stores have removed mercury thermometers from their shelves.

Some area stores are inviting the public to exchange their mercury thermometers for digital ones, the wholesale cost of \$1.99 for each new digital thermometer.

Keep Firearms Locked Up!

From the Oregon City Police Department

As I am typing this message, the media is airing the latest school shooting. It has just occurred in California where two were killed and thirteen wounded. In Oregon during 1999, a total of 16 children were killed with firearms. This figure is down from 20 in 1998 and 26 in 1997. Of the 16 deaths in 1999, eight were suicides.

A firearm death cannot occur if the victim or perpetrator does not have access to a firearm. "Safer storage" of firearms has been defined as storing a firearm unloaded and in a locked place separate from the ammunition.

Trigger locks can similarly make firearm storage safer. Firearms stored in this way may decrease the risk of impulsive suicides and homicides because of the time required accessing and loading the gun. Firearms stored in this way may also decrease the risk of unintentional shootings, since children can be effectively prevented from accessing those firearms. Please, do your part to help keep our children safer.

A Message from Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue

The recent "shaker" that struck the Northwest has made a captive audience out of anyone who has ignored the seismologists' and emergency officials' frequent warnings over the last several years. As a result, Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue would like to remind you of what to do during and after an earthquake.

What to do during an earthquake

In an earthquake, keep calm and stay where you are. Most injuries during earthquakes occur when people are hit by falling objects while entering or exiting buildings.

If you are indoors, take cover under a sturdy desk, table or bench, or against an inside wall, and hold on. Stay away from glass, windows, outside doors or walls and anything that could fall, such as lighting fixtures or furniture. If you are outdoors, stay there. Move away from buildings, streetlights and utility wires. In a crowded public place, do not rush for a doorway - other people will have the same idea. Take cover, and move away from display shelves containing objects that can fall.

In a high-rise building, get under a sturdy desk, away from windows and outside walls. Stay in the building on the same floor, an evacuation may not be necessary. Be aware that the electricity may go out, sprinkler heads may go off or there might be false fire alarms. Do not use elevators.

What to do after an earthquake

Be prepared for aftershocks: These secondary shock waves are usually less violent than the main quake but can be strong enough to do additional damage to weakened structures. **Check for injuries:** Do not attempt to move seriously injured persons unless they are in immediate danger of death or further injury. If you must move an unconscious person, first stabilize the neck and back, then call for help immediately.

If the electricity goes out use flashlights or battery powered lanterns. Do not use candles, matches or open flames indoors after the earthquake because of possible gas leaks. Wear sturdy shoes in areas covered with fallen debris and broken glass.

Clean up spilled medicines, bleaches, gasoline and other flammable liquids inside buildings. Evacuate the building if gasoline fumes are heavy and the building is not well ventilated.

- Visually inspect utility lines and appliances for damage.
 - If you smell gas or hear a hissing or blowing sound, open a window and leave the building. Shut off the main gas valve outside, if you can. Report the leak to the Gas Company from a neighbor's house. Stay out of the building. If you shut off the gas supply at the main valve, you will need a professional to turn it back on.
 - If there is electrical damage, switch off all electrical power at the main fuse box or circuit breaker.
 - If water pipes are damaged shut off the water supply at the main valve.
 - Do not flush toilets until you know that sewage lines are intact.
 - Listen to news reports for the latest emergency information.
 - Use the phone only to report a life-threatening emergency.
