I hope I am wrong, but you should look carefully at any and all ploys, measures, and s, which come along this political year, and exercise your own good judgment.



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Access to the transfer station will be considerably shorter during the week. Loads for disposal may include household hazardous waste, yard debris, scrap metal, tires, appliances and motorized equipment (i.e. refrigerators and mowers). All loads must be covered with tarps. 

## Mind Your Investments at the Library

Morningstar, famous for its mutual fund investment newsletter, recently launched "Stock Investor", a financial newsletter that covers individual stocks. The library has received its first issue, which is available for public use at the business reference table.

## More Records Fall

Your library continues to be an increasingly busy place. In recent months new records for just about every activity have been set. On February 19th the library checked out 2,886 items – a 10% increase over the previous one-day record. Recent activity indicators also include the hourly loan rate, which is now just over 200 items, and new patron registrations, which are running over 300 a month.

## “Food for Fines” Month

For several years now the library has participated in the countywide “Food for Fines” program during the month of February. Each year the amount collected has inched up, but this year’s collection was about 50% more than last year. Altogether we collected nearly seven barrels of food that are destined for the community Food Bank.

## Spring Construction Projects

With the warmer, dry weather comes road construction season. The following construction project will be starting this month causing some inconveniences. However, when it is complete our community will be able to enjoy this area for years to come. Please respect the workers and drive carefully in work zones. Your patience and cooperation are greatly appreciated.

- Molalla Avenue between Pearl Street and Barclay Hills Drive - Major capital improvements will begin in April 2002 and be complete in the fall. Lane closures will occur throughout the project, and delays can be expected. Two water lines will be replaced, the pavement will be reconstructed, pedestrian cross walks will be improved, the sidewalks will be widened, bicycle lanes will be added, and the existing four-lane section will be re-stripped to a three-lane section that incorporates a dedicated left turn lane. This turn lane is expected to provide a much more secure environment for turning on and off of Molalla. At the end of the project, the street will be decorated with landscaping and decorative street lights. ## How to Check Your Sprinkler System

Now is the time to start checking your sprinkler system for a peak summer performance – it’s one of the most important things you can do to keep your system operating efficiently.

Because automatic sprinkler systems often come on in the early morning hours (unobserved by their owners) leaks and other problems can go unnoticed for long periods of time. When this happens water is wasted and plants can get damaged. By taking the time to check, repair, and adjust the sprinklers at the beginning of the watering season—and making periodic checks throughout the summer—you can be sure your plants are being watered properly, without wasting water.

### Spring Checklist:

1. Close all manual drains (the sprinkler system was probably drained last fall) and make sure that none of the manual drain valves have been left open.
2. Slowly open the main valve and allow the mainline piping from the main valve to the backflow prevention to fill with water.
3. Have the backflow prevention assembly tested by a state certified tester – many local water providers can supply a list of testers. [Atmospheric Vacuum Breaker’s (AVB’s) do not require a test]. Contact the City for requirements.

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4. Pressurize the mainline from the backflow prevention assembly to the control valves – have one of the control valves open while you do this so that air trapped in the piping can escape through the sprinkler heads as the pipes fill with water.
5. Most important! Run the entire sprinkler system, one zone at a time. As you do this, check the following: 1) Signs of leakage, caused by damage to the heads or piping during the winter months, and repair as needed. 2) Spray Pattern of the sprinklers can be inefficient. Sometimes nozzles get clogged and need to be cleaned. Also, nozzles and sprinkler may need adjustments to reduce overspray onto walks, driveways, etc. 3) Interference of the spray pattern can occur if plants have been moved, play equipment has been installed, or if plants have just grown too tall. Adjusting the sprinklers to accommodate the changing landscape will eliminate dry spots and puddling caused by blocked spray. 4) Overgrown Grass can impede spray heads – make sure to keep yours trimmed. 5) Finally, check for leaning spray heads and make adjustments.

## Water Quality News

On occasion, the Oregon City Water Division is asked how water customers would know if there is a problem with the drinking water. Federal and state water regulations require public notice be given to water users whenever a situation occurs that may affect public health. A notice must describe the situation; tell when it occurred and what adverse health effects may result. It must also explain what, if any, action consumers should take and provide a way for the public to get additional information concerning the notice.

Public notice requirements are divided into three tiers, or levels. A Tier 1 notice is required for situations with potential adverse health effects from short-term exposure. Examples include the detection of fecal coliform or E.Coli bacteria in the water, a waterborne disease outbreak, or an emergency that disrupts the water supply or distribution system. Tier 1 notices must be distributed within 24 hours to all persons served by the water system, usually by radio

and television broadcasts and public posting of notices.

A Tier 2 notice applies to situations with potential to have serious adverse effects on human health. These are usually from violations of monitoring or testing requirements that have not been determined to have the urgency of a Tier 1 notice. Tier 2 notices must be distributed as soon as practical, but within 30 days of the violation. Notices could be mailed directly to all customers or included in the monthly water bill.

Finally, a Tier 3 notice is the “other violations or situations” category. This could result from not complying with a testing procedure or other violation that would not have the potential to have adverse effects on human health. Tier 3 notices must be distributed within one year, and can be included in the annual drinking water quality report.

## Children Can't Fly

Fall injuries are more common than most parents realize. Throughout Oregon and the U.S., they are the leading cause of non-fatal unintentional injuries and emergency department visits for children less than 15 years old. Each year in the U.S., falls among this age-group kill approximately 120 and account for an estimated 2.5 million emergency department visits – children less than 5 years old account for more than 50% of both categories. In 2000, Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue crews (district-wide) treated 190 fall patients less than 11 years old, representing 62% of all injuries for that age group. Of those, 113 were less than 5 years old (72% of all injuries for that age group).

As with many other types of childhood injuries, a common component of falls involving children younger than 5 years old, particularly infants, is lack of appropriate supervision. This includes leaving an infant on a changing table or other surface for “just a minute,” allowing a toddler to play in a room without secure windows, or allowing a toddler to crawl on a balcony with ineffective railing protection. Almost 80% of infants injured in falls are in the same room as their caregiver.

### Here are some helpful reminders:

- NEVER leave children unattended on changing tables, beds, sofas, etc.
- Strap children into highchairs, swings, strollers, etc.
- Don't let children play unattended on balconies, porches, fire escapes.
- Don't let children play near windows or patio doors.
- Avoid use of baby walkers on wheels.
- Use safety gates at tops and bottoms of stairs if infants or toddlers are in the home.
- Move furniture away from windows and draperies.
- Screens were meant to keep bugs out, not kids in; install window guards when needed.
- Use slip-resistant mats or stickers in bathtubs.

## Feng Shui Classes


