## CPR AND AEDs: A Life-Saving Combination

The East Division has a new life-saving device in its administrative office (located in the main fire station of Oregon City, 624 Seventh Street). Thanks to a district initiative by Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue, every administrative office will house an automated external defibrillator (AED) to be used on a heart attack victim. *Defibrillation is a process in which an electronic device--the AED--helps reestablish normal contraction rhythms in a heart that's not beating properly. It does this by delivering an electric shock to the heart.*

Though some fire district offices are connected to a fire station (such as Oregon City), many times fire apparatus--which also contain an AED--are on a call

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out of the station when a citizen may arrive needing medical assistance. (Last year in Oregon City, approximately six people came to the office complaining of heart attack symptoms.) Since the AED initiative was established, all administrative staff is trained to operate the device in addition to their routine CPR training.

According to the American Heart Association, it's essential to integrate early defibrillation into an effective, emergency cardiac care system. This means employing the "chain of survival" concept. The components of this concept are:

- Early Access - to the emergency medical services system.
- Early CPR - cardiopulmonary resuscitation when needed.
- Early Defibrillation - when indicated.
- Early Advanced Cardiac Care.

Early bystander cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and rapid defibrillation are the two major contributors to survival of adult victims of sudden cardiac arrest. Automatic external defibrillation is one of the most promising methods for achieving rapid defibrillation. (Visit the American Heart Association's web site at [americanheart.org](http://americanheart.org) for more information on heart health.)

Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue's AED initiative is part of a nationwide movement to have AEDs available in every public building. TVF&R and agencies such as the American Heart Association believe that this is the next step in strengthening the chain of survival. Today's AEDs are portable, reasonably priced, and easy to use thanks to instructional voice commands. ## National Night Out Celebrations

On Tuesday, August 7th, neighborhoods throughout Oregon City will join forces with thousands of communities nationwide for the 18th Annual National Night Out (NNO). National Night Out, is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch (NATW) and co-sponsored locally by the City of Oregon City Police Department and Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue. It is designed to: (1) heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; (2) generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime efforts; (3) strengthen neighborhood spirit and police/community partnerships; and (4) send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back against crime.

From 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. on August 7th, residents from neighborhoods throughout Oregon City are asked to lock their doors, turn on outside lights and spend the evening outside with neighbors and representatives from police and fire. Many Neighborhood Associations throughout Oregon City will be hosting a variety of special events such as block parties, cookouts, ice cream socials, dessert extravaganzas, neighborhood walks and information fairs. The evening's activities will include visits by the Oregon City Police Department, Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue and local elected officials. Neighborhood Associations participating this year include Canemah, Hazel Grove, Hillendale, Gaffney Lane, McLoughlin, Park Place and Rivercrest.

Police Chief Gordon Huiras said, "I encourage everyone in Oregon City to take the time to get to know your neighbors and their children at National Night

Out events happening throughout Oregon City. National Night Out is a great time to get to know not only another but your local law enforcement officers as well." This year the Oregon City Police Department and Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue have donated funds to purchase Frisbees, balloons, glow necklaces and pinwheels for the event.

National Night Out 2001 is the City's largest annual crime prevention event. It is an excellent way to build neighborhood unity and strengthen community partnerships. "On the 7th, we invite residents city-wide to join forces with us by turning on their porch lights and give crime and drugs a going away party," said Police Chief Huiras. ## Volunteers Needed at Transitional Housing


In late April 2001 the Jackson Street Transitional Housing opened its doors at 6th and Jackson in the McLoughlin neighborhood. This completely renovated apartment building has seven units that will house homeless single adults and childless couples for up to two years. Each resident will be actively working toward building skills that will make him or her more able to be self-sufficient.

Volunteers are now needed for one-time and on-going projects. The first goal is to get all of the apartments furnished with household items such as sheets, pillowcases, blankets, towels, wastebaskets, clocks, dishtowels, salt and pepper shakers, etc.

"Thrifty shoppers" are also needed. Since there are limited financial resources to support this project, we are looking for volunteers who like to shop for bargains with money we have budgeted. People with pick up trucks who are willing to pick up donations are also needed.

There are a lot of volunteer opportunities for individuals, groups and families to join in. It is hoped that the people of Oregon City will make the Jackson Street Apartments feel like a comforting place, a home for homeless people to live as they strive for self-sufficiency.

## Chinook Winds Casino Trip



## The Right Amount of Water

Much of the water that is used for lawn watering is wasted due to evaporation and poor watering techniques. Typically established lawns need about 1 inch of water per week, a bit less in cool moist weather, and a bit more in hot dry weather. Here is a simple way to figure out how long to water your grass:

Set out 5 empty tuna cans (or something similar) at various places on your lawn within your sprinkler's range. Place cans halfway between the sprinklers and in the areas that generally receive the least amount of sprinkler water.

- Turn on your sprinklers for exactly 15 minutes.
- Measure the depth of the water in each can. Add the numbers and divide by 5 to get

the *average water depth* (in inches) of all of the cans.


- If the average water depth in the cans (in inches) after 15 minutes is  $\frac{1}{4}$ " then you will need to water for 60 minutes. If it is  $\frac{1}{2}$ " then water for 30 minutes. If  $\frac{3}{4}$ " then water for 20 minutes. Finally, if you get 1 inch of water, you will only need to water for 15 minutes.
