


chocolate! Visit Historic Oregon City instead. Pick up your pass February 14th through 16th. For information please call 503-650-1851.

Traffic Grant News

The Oregon City Police Department was notified in September 2001 that the Department would receive two traffic enforcement grants.

The first grant the Police Department will receive is \$15,000 for Enhanced DUII Enforcement. This is an increase from the \$10,000 the Department has been receiving during the past several years.

The second grant awarded is to enforce safety belt violations. This year the Department will be receiving \$5,000 for enforcement efforts, which is an increase from the \$3,000 awarded the previous year.

Each grant provides funds for officers to work overtime, aggressively enforcing traffic laws. This year the grants have a condition that an average of two enforcement contacts is expected per hour of overtime worked. The Oregon Association of Chiefs of Police manages this federal grant program for the State of Oregon.

Tips on How to "Park Smart"

The following parking tips are offered by the Oregon City Police Department:


- Be aware of your surroundings and trust your instincts. When parking your car, look around and observe what and who is around you. If you have doubts about something, move your car to another spot.
- Look for available lighting when you park your car in a lot or on the street. Try to park under street lamps or near building entrances. Thieves often find cars, left in the dark or out of the way places, attractive.
- Don't leave valuables in the car that are visible from the outside. A purse or packages from department stores left in the car invite potential thieves.
- If you must leave valuables in the car, do not open the trunk to store the

valuables at the same location you are parking your car. Thieves looking for an opportunity can observe you stowing the valuables and then leaving. If you must leave them in the car, stow them in the trunk and then move your car to another spot.

- Don't leave spare keys in the car. Most common hiding places of spare keys are well known to thieves.
- Lock your car at all times--when you leave it and when you are in it.
- Never leave your car running with the keys in it while you go somewhere for "just a minute". Remember that theft is frequently a crime of opportunity.
- Never leave your garage door opener in your car if it is parked outside over night or for a long period of time. Thieves will break into your car, take the garage door opener, and then return to burglarize your home when you are gone.

Water Quality News

We get frequent calls asking if the drinking water in Oregon City is fluoridated. Fluoride is a naturally occurring component of the earth's crust. This inorganic chemical can be found in just about all drinking water sources but the amount found can vary widely.

Drinking water in Oregon City comes from the Clackamas River and the concentration of fluoride in the water is extremely low. No additional fluoride is added to the water during the treatment process.

Consuming water that contains fluoride has been shown to decrease tooth decay. Contact your dental health care provider to see if fluoride supplements are recommended for your children.


March 7th ~ Celebrate St. Patrick's day with a return engagement of the group Innisfree. They perform traditional

New Booster Seat Law

On January 1st Oregon House Bill 3155 took effect. This bill requires that a child who is at least four years of age and under six years of age, or weighs between 40 and 60 pounds, must be properly secured with a child safety system that elevates the child so that a safety belt or safety harness properly fits. "Proper fit" means the lap belt of the safety belt or safety harness is positioned low across the thighs and the shoulder belt is positioned over the collarbone and away from the neck.

The former law only included children up to 4 years of age and forty pounds; so many parents will need to reevaluate the way their child is restrained. Child safety seat inspections are also done at the main fire station in Oregon City, every Friday by

Child Safety Seat Reminders

Infants should be in rear-facing car seats until they are at least 1 year old AND at least 20 pounds. Children over 1 year old and between 20 and 40 pounds can be in forward-facing car seats. The best practice is to have children, between 40 and about 60/80 pounds (usually 4 to 8 years old), in booster seats. Usually children over 80 pounds and 8 years old can fit correctly in lap/shoulder belts.

Acupuncture at the Pioneer Adult Community Center.

Fixing Faucet Leaks

Big or small leaks dribble away water and can add up. If you leave any of your faucets slightly open, be more careful and close them tightly. A leaky faucet can waste up to 20 gallons of water a day. If the water is hot, you are heating the water before you waste it, which can be very expensive.

In almost every case, a faulty seat washer (also called a stem washer or “O” rings) is the cause of a faucet that still drips even though the handle has been tightly closed. This is true for the kitchen, bath, tub and shower faucets. With just a little bit of effort, you can replace this washer yourself. (*If you are not confident call a plumber*).

First, determine whether your faucet is washerless or is a compression type faucet and what the brand name and model # is if possible. Before you start, make sure you protect any shiny parts of your faucet by wrapping them with a couple of layers of masking tape. This will keep them from getting scratched by your wrench. Place a towel in the sink to cover the drain. This will prevent any small parts from falling down the drain.

Tools and supplies you may need include: a compression type faucet, a slotted or Phillips screwdriver, an adjustable wrench or pliers, and replacement washers and a tap fixer tool. These may need to be purchased at a hardware store. While there ask lots of questions.

Next, determine if the leak is coming from the around the handle, from the stem or from the faucet itself.

If the leak is coming from around the handle, follow steps 1 and 2. Then cover the threads beneath the packing nut with Teflon tape and tighten it gently. Never over tighten this nut. If the leak persists, remove the nut entirely, replace the nylon washer underneath and reassemble the faucet.

If it is coming from the stem of the faucet follow steps 1, 2 and 3. Then unscrew the stem from the six-sided packing nut to expose the plastic O-ring. Pinch the O-ring on the stem to get a finger hold, then pull it off. Replace with an exact match that has been lubricated with a little petroleum jelly and reassemble the faucet.

If it is coming from the faucet itself then you will need to follow all of the following steps to repair the leak.

- Step 1. Check to see if the faucet is leaking hot or cold water. You may have to fix one handle unit, not both. Shut off the water supply valves under the sink. If you cannot locate them or if they will not shut off, shut off the master supply to the house. Turn on both faucets to let the water drain.
- Step 2. If there is a decorative plastic button on top of the handles, slip the blade of your screwdriver under the edge and twist the screwdriver gently. The button should pop right off. Unscrew the top screw with the screwdriver and pull or pry off the handle. It may stick because of rust. Take it off as gently as possible. Never bang the handle free- the inner workings might break.
- Step 3. Beneath the faucet handle is the stem. Fit your wrench to the large six-sided packing nut and loosen it. It may unscrew in either direction, so try turning it the opposite way if it does not loosen on your first try. Unscrew the nut with your fingers until you can lift the whole stem out of the faucet.
- Step 4. On the bottom of the stem, the bottom screw holds a rubber washer in place. Unscrew it, put a new washer of the same size in place, and then replace the screw.
- Step 5. Rub a little petroleum jelly on the threads at the bottom of the stem. Screw the stem back into place, tightening it with your wrench. Put the handle back on and turn the water supply on.

Clackamas County Hazard Mitigation Workshop, February 26th

Can floods, earthquakes, landslides, wildfire, severe winter storms, windstorms and volcanoes impact Clackamas County? YES! These natural hazards can cause loss of life and property, disrupt businesses, and impact the day-to-day lives of Clackamas County citizens.

Clackamas County has taken steps to reduce risk and prevent loss from these hazards by partnering with the University of Oregon to develop the Clackamas County Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan.

Mitigation is the development of activities, such as education, outreach planning and community partnerships, that are designed to reduce or eliminate impacts resulting from natural hazards. The goal of the Plan is to make Clackamas County a more disaster-resistant community, by fostering partnerships among various agencies and the public.

Although the County Plan focuses on the unincorporated areas, it will provide a tool for cities in developing their own mitigation plans. Oregon City adopted a Hazard Mitigation Plan in 1998, and will revisit their plan to assure compatibility with the County Plan.

Help protect your County’s citizens, economy and environment by participating in the Natural Hazards Mitigation Workshop, on February 26th from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., at the Sunnybrook Auditorium (9101 SE Sunnybrook Blvd.). We will talk about what natural hazard mitigation is, and gather the ideas and issues that Clackamas County citizens want addressed by the Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan. There will also be a drawing for a door prize at the end of the meeting.
