Learn more about recycling, preventing waste and saving resources! Share your knowledge with others in the community and make a difference!

The Master Recycler volunteer program is a partnership between OSU Extension Service, Recycling Advocates and local governments. The 30-hour training in all aspects of solid waste includes 8 evening sessions, 2 field trips and a home-composting workshop. Master Recyclers pay back their training costs by providing 30 hours of recycling and waste reduction education at community events.

## Information Search Classes Expanded

The library's classes on utilizing computer-based information resources continue through January with classes being offered on Monday evenings at 6:30 p.m. Due to numerous requests, additional classes are being offered on Thursday afternoons - call the library's reference department (657-8269) for details and sign-up.

These classes focus on three different aspects of data searching: the increasingly sophisticated library network computer system (major changes coming in the next year!); the more specialized resources such as magazine and newspaper databases; and, finally, the Internet with instruction for both beginners and the more sophisticated.



## Library Adds Third Internet Station

Internet users at the library were pleased to see the recent addition of a third Internet station at the library. Demand for the library's two stations has grown tremendously in recent months with November's registrations nearly double that of the same period a year ago.

Use of the library's Internet stations requires (1) a valid library card, (2) register and signed User's Agreement. Children ages 13 and younger are required to have signed parental approval to use the stations. The library's provision of Internet access is based on its information capabilities and so usage is limited to that purpose.

## Parks and Recreation Master Plan Process

An open forum was held on November 9, 1998 at the Pioneer Community Center for citizens to provide input into the types of parks and recreational services they would like to see within the community. When asked what facilities were most needed in Oregon City, the most common responses were a skate park, open space areas and an indoor recreation center. Recreational program requests included: expanding the children's museum, support of the summer programs and existing programs.

### PARKS MAINTENANCE

All groups indicated that the parks should be maintained at a higher level. Preferred park system - large parks containing a combination of sports fields and neighborhood facilities received the most support. Several groups preferred the 3-5 acre multiuse park. A survey of 700 citizens throughout the city has been completed and results will be available at the January 4th meeting.

## Skate Park Update

Oregon City Parks and Recreation has sponsored two skate jams in the past to provide an avenue for skaters to skate. Both were temporary one-day events with an average attendance of 200 skaters. Oregon City Parks and Recreation is now partnering with Gladstone Community Education and the City of Gladstone to build a permanent skate park on McLoughlin Avenue next to McDonalds, Inc.





# THE OREGON CITY REGIONAL CENTER PLAN



The next date for the Regional Center Plan Steering Committee and public meeting has been tentatively set for late January or early February. The purpose of this meeting will be to review alternatives on the alignment of McLoughlin and land use schemes. Through group consensus from the November 2nd meeting, the City's consultants were directed to prepare an evaluation of the alternatives being considered.

The three alternatives for the alignment of McLoughlin are shown below. Although these alternatives include different land use schemes, the most popular of alternatives included commercial uses for the downtown area between 6th and 11th Streets, mixed uses for the north part of town between 11th and 16th Streets, the area around the End of the Trail Center for open space/recreation/commercial, and the area around Clackamette Cove to contain a mix of residential and open space.



- 1) Keep McLoughlin in the same location and improve it with landscaping and other amenities.



- 2) Build a structural lid over a portion of McLoughlin Boulevard between 7th and 10th Streets.



- 3) Realign McLoughlin onto Main Street, between 12th and 15th Streets, with McLoughlin swinging back to its original alignment, between 10th and 12th Streets.



The evaluation report will look at land uses, transportation, and market feasibility elements of the alternatives. This information will help the Steering Committee and the public make a decision on the best alternative to further pursue and implement in the Regional Center Plan. This information will be made available in the form of a packet prior to the next meeting. At the meeting itself, additional supporting information such as maps, commentary, and explanations will be provided prior to any final recommendation from the Steering Committee and the public. Notices for the next confirmed meeting date will be advertised in the Oregonian, Clackamas Review, Oregon City News, and neighborhood newsletters. Notices will also be posted at City Hall, the Oregon City Elevator, and the Pioneer Community Center.

The Regional Center Plan Steering Committee, the City of Oregon City, and the consulting team would like to thank everyone who has participated in the process thus far and we would like to encourage the continued enthusiasm and public participation in the process.

## City Business License Renewals

The City of Oregon City, pursuant to Title 5: Business Licenses and Regulations of the City of Oregon City Municipal Code, requires a business license to conduct business in the city limits of Oregon City. This includes a business operating out of a residence, a business located inside city limits and companies that conduct business within the city. Rates are determined by the number of people involved with the business and whether the business is located inside or outside of Oregon City limits. The fee raises approximately \$85,000 annually, which assists in the costs of regulation and in defraying the cost of police, fire protection and costs of other municipal services.

Business licenses are issued for the calendar year. Renewal forms were mailed in November 1998 and are due by the end of January. Renewals that are not received by Friday, January 29, 1999 at 5:00 p.m. will be charged delinquent fees. City licenses are also required for coin operated vending machines, secondhand dealers, gambling operations and mobile home parks. ## See A Life, Save A Life

The Oregon City Fire Department has the opportunity to purchase a new piece of firefighting equipment, which may save countless lives in Oregon City.

This new technology is a remarkable camera that provides firefighters with the ability to see through smoke to locate trapped or unconscious victims. During a fire, smoke is often the greatest enemy of firefighters; it can become so thick that firefighters cannot see even a few feet and they put themselves at risk by entering structures "blind" to search for victims they cannot see, feel, or sometimes, even hear. The Thermal Imaging Camera uses specially developed infrared sensor technology which makes pictures from heat rather than light; the warmer the source, the brighter the image. Looking through the viewfinder of the camera, firefighters can find victims who are unconscious from smoke inhalation or children who may be hiding under beds or inside closets.



The Thermal Imaging Camera is an indispensable piece of equipment, no less important than a fire engine, ladder truck, or even the men and women who operate them; however, it is an expensive item with a price tag of \$18,000 per camera - far beyond the limits of our annual budget. To obtain this essential life saving camera at the earliest possible time, the Oregon City Fire Department is launching a community-wide fund-raising campaign and hopes to reach our goal of \$18,000 by March 1, 1999. If funds received exceed the \$18,000 goal, the excess will be used to help purchase additional cameras.

The fund-raiser, "See A Life, Save A Life" will seek community support via cash donations and money drives. Donation cans will be placed in stores and restaurants throughout the city. Letters are being sent to local businesses that have a strong presence and influence in the community. Local schools will assist by organizing money drives and fund-raisers. Civic organizations and community groups will also join in this effort.

We are asking that you, PLEASE, join in and help save lives! The Oregon City Fire Department and the citizens of Oregon City need your support! ## From Your Finance Department


City of Oregon City finance and governance includes two other municipal entities. One is the Oregon City Urban Renewal Agency and the other is the South Fork Water Board. The Oregon City Urban Renewal Agency was organized October 5, 1983 under the provisions of Oregon Revised Statutes, Chapter 457, to provide rehabilitation of blighted and deteriorated areas within the City's designated urban renewal areas (Hilltop/Redsoils and Downtown/Northend). Some projects have or will include: Beaver Creek Road realignment, Downtown Streetscapes, downtown parking, Carnegie renovation and Clackamette Cove. The Oregon City Commission is the governing body of the Agency. Principal funding sources are property tax revenues, land sales and interest earnings. The 1998-99 budgets for Hilltop and downtown are \$4,880,069 and \$6,580,446 respectively. Property tax levies for Hilltop and Downtown for 1998-99 are \$938,653 and \$1,118,673 respectively.

Since 1915 South Fork Water Board has been a municipal water distribution system under an Oregon Revised Statutes, Chapter 190, intergovernmental agreement between the cities of Oregon City and West Linn. The water facilities serve approximately 46,000 residents in the two cities, plus 10,000 Clackamas River Water District customers. The six-member board is comprised of the mayor and two city council members from each of the two cities. Principal funding is from wholesale water sales. The Board has seven employees. The 1998-99 budget is \$6,873,132.

The City of Oregon City Finance Department is responsible for the accounting, budget compliance and financial audit liaison for both of these entities.
