Will a Fire Start in Your Own Backyard?

It only takes one spark from a burning pile of yard debris to ignite a raging fire when winds are high, conditions are very dry, and there is plenty of ground fuel. For that reason, fire authorities are watching conditions in the rural and wild land areas very closely.

Burning Bans During Fire Season

Typically, a seasonal ban on all backyard and agricultural burning is enacted by the Fire Defense Boards of each county around June 15th and stays effective until October. Contact your local media to find out when the seasonal burn ban goes into effect.

If, by chance, a countywide ban on burning is not yet in effect and you live outside of a permanent municipal burn ban area, you must determine each morning if it is a permitted "burn day" by calling the appropriate DEQ Burning Information line for Clackamas County at 503-632-0211.

To determine if you are within a permanent municipal burn ban area and for specific guidelines for backyard or agricultural burning, please contact the East Division Office at 503-657-1365.

Alternatives to Burning Yard Debris

There are several options other than burning yard debris:

- Hire a professional yard clean up or debris hauling service.
- Take advantage of neighborhood clean up or yard debris drop-off events hosted by various local, city or county agencies or organize one in your area. Or, take debris to central recycling centers or landfills (call METRO Recycling at 503-234-3000 for a complete listing).
- Consider composting the debris (call METRO Recycling at 503-234-3000 for composting instructions).


2001 Concerts in the Park

Clackamette Park Boat Ramp Closure

Clackamette Park boat ramp will be closed July 16th through August 13th as a result of a grant awarded to the City of Oregon City by the Oregon State Marine Board. The grant in the amount of \$128,000 will renovate, repair, and add floats to the boat ramp at the park. The City of Oregon City is providing \$25,000, as well as providing contract administration and project inspection for this project. 4 Rivers Construction of Oregon City has been awarded the contract for this project.

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When completed, boarding floats will be added and the ramp will be realigned and extended to allow for safe launching during periods of extreme low water which occur during the late summer and early fall boating season. Oregon City Parks and Recreation is pleased to announce these improvements, which will enhance the safety of this popular launching site.

During the construction closure, boaters are reminded to use the ramp at Sportsraft Marina, just south of Clackamette Park, or the ramp at Meldrum Bar in Gladstone.

National Night Out 2001

On Tuesday, August 7th, neighborhoods throughout Oregon City will join forces with thousands of communities nationwide for the 18th Annual National Night Out (NNO) crime and drug prevention event.

National Night Out, which is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch (NATW) and co-sponsored locally by the City of Oregon, City Police Department and Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue, will involve over 9,600 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases around the world. In all, over 32 million people are expected to participate in "America's Night Out Against Crime".

Once again this year, S. C. Johnson is the lead, national corporate sponsor and is supported in part by the U. S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance. National Night Out is designed to: (1) Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; (2) Generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime efforts; (3) Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police/community partnerships; and (4) Send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

From 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. on August 7th, residents from neighborhoods throughout Oregon City are asked to lock their doors, turn on outside lights and spend the evening outside with neighbors and representatives from police and fire. Many Neighborhood Associations throughout Oregon City will be hosting a

variety of special events such as block parties, cookouts, ice cream socials, dessert extravaganzas, neighborhood walks and information fairs. The evening's activities will include visits by the Oregon City Police Department, Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue and local elected officials. Watch for more details in the August Trail News.

Police Chief Gordon Huiras said, "National Night Out 2001 is Oregon City's largest annual crime prevention event. It is an excellent way to build neighborhood unity and strengthen community partnerships. On August 7th, we invite residents citywide to join forces with us by turning on their porch lights and to give crime and drugs a going away party."




Jessie Court Park Public Workshops



Skin Cancer

Sun damage also causes skin cancer. The chance of developing skin cancer increases as people age, especially for those who live in sunny areas of the country. The best defense against skin cancer is paying attention to the warning signs. If there is a sudden change in the look of a mole or a new spot, see a doctor. Look for differences in color, size, shape or surface quality (scaliness, oozing, crusting or bleeding). Have a doctor check any dark colored spots.

The best way to keep skin healthy is to avoid sun exposure beginning early in life. Do not sunbathe or visit tanning parlors and try to stay out of the sun between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Wear protective clothing such as a hat or long sleeved shirt and sunglasses. Put on sunscreen lotion before going out in the sun. It's never too late to begin protecting yourself!

Summer Water Wise Tips

In the summer water use in our area doubles and can even triple. This is due mostly to outdoor water use. Here are 10 things you can do to save water outside this summer:

1. Water your lawn only when it needs it ~ a good way to see if your lawn needs water is to step on the grass. If it springs back up when you move, it doesn't need water. If it stays flat, fetch the sprinkler.
2. Deep soak your lawn ~ when you do water, do it long enough for the moisture to soak down to the roots where it will do the most good. A light sprinkling can evaporate quickly and tend to encourage shallow root systems.
3. Water during the cool part of the day to avoid evaporation ~ early morning is generally better than dusk since it helps prevent growth of fungus.
4. Don't water the pavement ~ position your sprinkler so water lands on the lawn or garden, not on paved areas. Also, avoid watering on windy days.
5. Plant drought-resistant trees and plants ~ many beautiful trees and plants thrive with far less watering than other plants.
6. Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants ~ mulch will slow evaporation and moisture loss while discouraging weed growth.
7. Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways and sidewalks.
8. Don't run the hose while washing your car ~ clean the car with a bucket of soapy water. Use the hose just to rinse it off.
9. Use a commercial car wash that recycles water.
10. Set mower blades one notch higher since longer grass means less evaporation.
