Oregon City Looking For A Few Good Citizens

City Planning Commission

Citizens are being recruited to fill a position on the City Planning Commission. The Commission reviews local land-use plans and advises the City Commission on matters pertaining to land-use, growth and development issues.

The seven-member, voluntary Commission is a permanent advisory committee appointed by the Mayor for a full term of four years. The Commission meets twice monthly on the second and fourth Mondays. The Planning Division of the Community Development Department provides staff support to the Commission.

Persons with an interest or knowledge in land-use issues are encouraged to apply. The Commission is required to represent a wide distribution of interests with no more than two members engaged in buying or selling of real estate or engaged in the same kind of business. Persons engaging in legal work as an attorney, as a primary source of income, need not apply since this quota has been filled.



Surface Water Management in Oregon City


"Surface water" refers to creeks, streams and runoff from rain and irrigation. Managing surface water includes effectively draining runoff from impervious surfaces (streets, rooftops, etc.), providing flood management and protecting water quality.

We have a better understanding of the importance of water quality protection as we discover how much fish, wildlife and our own recreation activities depend on healthy, functional streams and watersheds. Protecting water quality means keeping surface water temperatures cool, keeping pollutants (such as bacteria, chemicals, oil and sediments) out of surface water and sustaining natural habitat around streams and drainage ways.

The Oregon City Storm Water Utility Division maintains the public drainage system to meet community needs, but also to comply with regulations set by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

What Can You Do to Prevent Surface Water Pollution?

As water runs downhill, it picks up pollutants such as oil, grease, pesticides, fertilizers and pet waste. These wash into waterways and impact the water quality. Protecting our neighborhood streams, wetlands and ultimately the Willamette and Clackamas Rivers



begins at home.

The City's Storm Water and Engineering Divisions are working hard to protect water quality and prevent local flooding, but we need your help. Here are some tips to help you protect local creeks and rivers that we all depend on for

beneficial uses:

- Only clean water belongs in storm drains or ditches.
- Keep leaves, grass, clippings, animal waste, dirt and litter out of storm drains, ditches, creeks, ponds, wetlands and streets.
- Properly dispose of or recycle motor oil, antifreeze, paint, solvents and other toxic materials. For proper disposal information, call Metro at 234-3000.
- Use non-toxic alternatives or least toxic pesticides and herbicides.
- Plant groundcover and shrubs to cover bare earth and prevent erosion. Native plants are recommended.
- Treat roofs during the summer to allow the treatment to soak into the roof and when there is less chance of high concentrations of the toxic chemicals readily washing off into the storm system and entering waterways.
- Sweep sidewalks and driveways and put the sweepings in the garbage to keep pollutants and litter out of waterways.
- Use automatic car washes that recycle the water and properly dispose of detergents. If you wash your car at home, park it on the grass to allow pollutants to filter through the soil.






Libros Por Ninos en Espanol




Computer Resource Classes at the Library

1999 First City Enhancement and Cleanup Event

This year's annual citywide enhancement and cleanup event is scheduled for Saturday, April 17, 1999 between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. at Clackamette Park, 1955 Clackamette Drive (located off McLoughlin Blvd. near the Oregon City Shopping Center McDonald's). The cleanup is an excellent opportunity to discard scrap metal, tires (four per household), litter and reusable articles (a Goodwill truck will be on site). Appliances containing Freon (refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners) will not be accepted.

Last year, the event collected over four tons of debris, 598 tires and 260 cars. The Enhancement and Cleanup is one of many events that recognize Earth Day, Arbor Day and the memory of Jon E. Storm, who will always be remembered for his dedication to the First City Enhancement event.

"We anticipate that this year's event will be another huge success," said Rick McClung, Director of the Oregon City Public Works Department. "Several other groups are once again supporting this event", he said. Sponsors include numerous local businesses and the Chamber of Commerce. The enhancement and cleanup event serves Oregon City residents. Identification will be required to discard material and Oregon City residents will not be charged. Regional Transportation Funding

Oregon City's Opportunities, Your Input is Needed!

Approximately \$76 million of federal funding is available for transportation projects in the entire Portland metropolitan area from 2000 through 2003. Local governments, Tri-

Met and the Port of Portland have submitted 150 priority transportation projects that have a total cost of more than \$300 million for funding consideration. Oregon City submitted applications requesting \$4.9 million in federal funding for the following three projects:

- Beaver Creek Road/Highway 213 Intersection Improvements (Funding requested: \$3 million)
- Beaver Creek Road Improvements from Molalla Avenue to Highway 213 (Funding requested: \$1.5 million)
- Washington Street Improvements - Restriping, signal, bike and pedestrian improvements (Funding requested: \$400,000)

These three projects represent only a small portion of road improvements that are needed throughout our community. The Beaver Creek Road/Highway 213 intersection represents the worst intersection in Oregon City and is a vital link regionally for industry, freight, and commuters. Making improvements there would also relieve other problems on the City's roads.

As you can imagine, the available \$76 million must be carefully assigned to worthy projects! Metro is responsible for this difficult task. The Metro staff will first rank the projects based on technical criteria. Then Metro and ODOT representatives will listen to public comments. Ultimately, the Metro Council awards the funding.

Oregon City faces the challenge of proving why our projects are worthy of the limited available funding! Your help is needed! A public meeting to present testimony and comments will be held at Clackamas Community College on March 17th from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Gregory Forum, Clackamas Community College. City staff and the Transportation Advisory Committee are organizing an effort to coordinate Oregon City's input to Metro. A meeting will be held on March 4, 1999 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at City Hall, 320 Warner Milne Road to plan for the March 17th public meeting. Please Come!

From Your Parks and Recreation Advisory Board

Members of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board met on January 25, 1999 and discussed the following items:

Skate Park – An open meeting was held for all interested parties on January 23rd. Twenty-three skaters and seven parents attended the meeting. Interest was high for a skate park to be built.

Time was spent with the skaters designing what they must have and what they want to have. An architect and civil engineer were on hand to keep the plans realistic. Representatives from Gladstone and Milwaukie attended the meeting. Gladstone is committed to completing the project as a cooperative effort, and Milwaukie expressed interest in doing the same. All participants want a concrete, outdoor skate area. A second meeting will be scheduled to include designers of the Burnside Park and an indoor skate area. When a design is completed, the group will begin their fund-raising efforts to complete the park.


Aquatics – During the windstorm of December three panels of plexiglass blew out at the pool. A discussion was held as to the extent of repair. An engineering firm was retained to determine the best repair to the system. Their suggestions ranged from replacement of the three panels to replacement of the entire system. It was decided to repair the three windows while completing the master plan. The master plan would determine the needed repairs for the entire facility. Support was given for this plan.

Pioneer Center – The Advisory Board of the center has completed their strategic plan, and is in the process of

refining it and implementing it. A discussion was held regarding hosting cooperative efforts for fund-raising, which would include the Pioneer Community Center, Aquatics, Carnegie Center and Recreation groups. Discussion was favorable for this to occur.

Boynton Water Tower Parking Lot Discussion – Chair Todd Kemhus attended the South End and Tower Vista neighborhood association meeting on January 21st. Of the people in attendance the opinion was that a parking lot is not wanted on that area. Other suggestions to relieve the congestion at Chapin Park included taking out one ball field, having games start late in the a.m. on weekends and re-designing the shape of the park. Mr. Sin from Oregon City planning will take suggestions and incorporate the best usage into the park.

Leland Road Property – The City recently acquired 15.3 acres off of Leland Road for a city park. A request was made to determine the type of park that it will be. A master plan for the park will need to be implemented before any ground breaking will occur.



Master Plan Process

At the January meeting the stakeholders requested a drive by of all existing parks and facilities within the city. It was felt that this was a needed educational experience to make the best decisions regarding the master plan process.

A needs assessment will be presented for the additional facilities needed within the city at the February meeting. Needs were determined by the average amount of usage per team for sports fields. Discussion will be held in February regarding the needs

for each facility. Look for additional details in following months.





From Your Finance Department

The Finance/Utility Billing Department has been taking steps to take care of potential Y2K problems in the areas that we can control. During the last half of 1998 the Department worked with the software vendor who provides programs for running our accounting system. We have received assurance through testing and documentation that the system is Y2K compliant. Our network of personal computers in City Hall is in the process of being checked and updated where necessary. We are using an outside vendor to aid us in this process because we do not have the luxury of having a full time data processing division. It is an added duty of a Finance person at the present time. We are confident that we are well on our way to being ready for Y2K for the areas, which we can control.

The South Fork Water Board, which provides water for Oregon City and West Linn, has verified that their operating system is ready. The water board is also taking extra precautions in the way of having standby generators ready just in case something outside of our control should go wrong.

Other departments are working on systems that may not be covered in the scope of the work mentioned above. They will be making reports on their progress in this newsletter throughout the year. We will also inform you if there is any significant Y2K information to report in our area as the year progresses.
