
Public Works Construction Ahead

The following construction projects will be starting soon and are likely to cause inconveniences. When complete, the areas will be much improved for our community to enjoy for years to come. Please respect the workers and drive carefully in work zones. Thank you in advance for your patience and cooperation.

- **Molalla Avenue between Pearl Street and Barclay Hills Drive** ~ Major capital improvements will start in April 2002 and be complete in the fall. Lane closures will occur throughout the project, and delays can be expected. Two water lines will be replaced, the pavement will be reconstructed, pedestrian cross

walks will be improved, the sidewalks will be widened, bicycle lanes will be added, and the existing four-lane section will be re-striped to a three-lane section that incorporates a dedicated left turn lane. This turn lane is expected to provide a much more secure environment for turning on and off of Molalla. At the end of the project, the street will be decorated with landscaping and decorative streetlights. - **Washington Street (Abernathy Creek) Bridge** ~ The bridge replacement will start in June 2002 and is expected to be complete (except for permanent pavement surfacing) in November 2002. The bridge will be closed, with a detour to Main Street available for traffic. Construction delays are expected to be minimal. The businesses on Washington Street between 16th and 17th Streets will be open and local traffic access will be allowed. - **Highway 213 between Interstate 205 and Redland Road** ~ Construction will begin in April 2002 and is expected to be complete in November 2002. The highway will remain open throughout the project, but lane closures and delays can be expected. An additional lane will be constructed on southbound Highway 213 to add capacity to this roadway section, the northbound I-205 off-ramp will be modified for easier traffic flow, and new traffic signals will be installed at Washington Street.





Warm Weather Means Mowing

It's hard to believe that mowing season is almost here. We would like to remind everyone to PLEASE not blow, rake or place your grass clippings in the street, as this can cause the catch basins to get clogged up, which leads to flooding when it rains, and allows chemicals and other pollutants to enter streams and rivers.

We have also had problems with people dumping grass clippings and other debris in and around our detention ponds. If you see anyone dumping in these water quality facilities, or other public property, please call Public Works at 503-657-8241 or Code Enforcement at 503-657-0891.

First City Cleanup and Enhancement Event

Oregon City residents can participate in the 15th Annual City Cleanup and Enhancement Event scheduled for Saturday, April 20th, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Vouchers will be available to Oregon City residents only. The vouchers entitle participants to dispose of household garbage and recyclable items at the Metro South Transfer Station from April 20th through the 26th. Access to the transfer station will be considerably shorter during the week. Loads for disposal may include household hazardous waste, yard debris, scrap metal, tires, appliances and motorized equipment (for example, refrigerators and mowers). *All loads must be covered with tarps.*

Jerry Herrmann, event chairman said, "In order for people to get free disposal privileges, they must pick up trip vouch-

ers at Clackamette Park, 1955 Clackamette Drive, on Saturday, April 20th, and dispose of it at the Metro South Transfer Station, 2001 Washington Street (remember to cover your items). Each year the Committee tries to make the cleanup day easier and more efficient for Oregon City residents."

Enhancement projects will also take place throughout the city on the 20th. Volunteers from SOLV, local neighborhood associations, businesses and the community at large will pick up litter, clean public landscapes, pull ivy, and plant trees and shrubs.

This year a limited number of vouchers are available for the elderly and disabled needing assistance with disposal. They may call B & B Leasing Company/Oregon City Garbage at 503-656-8403.

If you are interested in helping to cleanup a site or an enhancement project, report to Clackamette Park, April 20th at 9:00 a.m. for an orientation and safety talk. Last year over 200 volunteers participated in the event and 950 vouchers were used throughout the week. Three hundred customers disposed of hazardous waste, 120 tons of recycling including wood and metal, 400 tires and 422 tons of waste were taken to the Metro South Transfer Station. Over the nine days, an extra 120 tons were recycled. B&B Leasing disposed of 8 drop boxes equaling 16 1/2 tons.

We would like to thank all the community participants that assisted in last years Cleanup. Special thanks goes to B&B Leasing, METRO, SOLV, Del Bullock of Bud's Towing and the many other Oregon City businesses that took pride in our community and assisted.

The City and school district have sent a request to ODOT to install a signal at the Glen Oak/Caufield/Highway 213 intersection. 


Thank you from the Carnegie Center!

Water Quality News

Do you have an irrigation system for your lawn, garden or landscaping? Irrigation systems certainly make watering lawns and gardens easier and save your time. However, they require special equipment to prevent contaminated water from siphoning back into home plumbing and the public water supply. Irrigation systems not protected by approved backflow prevention devices endanger the health of a household, neighborhood, and community.

All irrigation systems – new or existing – must be equipped with an Oregon Health Division-approved backflow prevention device. Only properly installed, state-approved backflow prevention devices meet plumbing code and provide protection for the health of your family and neighbors.

Three of the four types of backflow prevention devices require annual testing to make sure they are working properly. Now is an excellent time to schedule that annual backflow assembly test. It’s because activity levels are currently running about 14% higher than for the same period last year. This is the second year of extremely high increases in library usage with the two-year increase (for the first 6 months of the fiscal year) now running 30% over 1999.

New Library Board Member Appointed

Greg Rogers, a resident of the Caufield Road area, has been appointed by the Mayor to a four-year term on the library board. Mr. Rogers fills one of four slots on the seven-member board designated for city residents.

Re-appointed to serve a second term on the board was Martha Wallauer. Martha fills one of the two board slots designated for residents of the rural area surrounding Oregon City. Along with serving as chair of the board in past years, Ms. Wallauer is active in the Friends of the Library, and currently serves as chair of their Outreach committee which collected and distributed over 300 bags of books to area children this Christmas.

The library board exists to advise the City Commission and library director on policy matters and library development as well as being advocates for library services generally.

The board meets on a monthly basis—usually the 4th Thursday.



Gardens of Natural Delights Tour

Metro’s fourth annual Gardens of Natural Delights tour on July 14th will showcase natural gardening techniques in residential yards and floral and vegetable gardens.

Here’s how to participate:

- Apply to be a host gardener if you are an experienced or novice gardener who controls garden pests, and/or maintains a garden, without using chemicals. Call Metro Recycling Information at 503-234-3000 for a host garden application. (Applications must be completed and returned to Metro by March 15th, 2002, to be considered for participation in this year’s tour.)
- Volunteer as a tour garden educator or facilitator. Garden educator volunteers must be knowledgeable about natural gardening, and or have practical experience with natural gardening techniques. Volunteer facilitators greet guests, manage guest sign in and distribute natural gardening brochures. Tour registration is limited each year and volunteers have guaranteed registration. Volunteer shifts are limited to three hours, and provide volunteers with an opportunity to visit gardens after their volunteer shifts. - Natural gardening ~ it’ll grow on you. The primary purpose of the tour is to demonstrate that by using natural gardening techniques, you can have a healthy, attractive garden without the use of synthetic fertilizers, insecticides and herbicides. The tour is an educational component of Metro’s natural gardening program.
