

Fire Service Transition Update



As most citizens are already aware, the City of Oregon City's contract for fire protection and emergency services with Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue (TVF&R) expires on June 30, 2003. TVF&R's transition team, designed to


ensure that citizens will experience a seamless changeover between providers, has been working for the last ten months to ensure that all aspects of operation will continue running smoothly. Thanks to help from Clackamas County Fire District #1 (who will assume responsibility for all fire protection and emergency services in the City on July 1st) and City of Oregon City representatives, most plans for the transition have been solidified.

At the time of this writing, there are also plans to have Clackamas County Fire District #1 firefighters occupy the Hilltop Fire Station on March 1st in an effort to help them become more familiar with the City.


Water Quality News

Do you have an irrigation system for your lawn, garden or landscaping? Irrigation systems certainly make watering lawns and gardens easier. However, they require special equipment to prevent contaminated water from seeping back into home plumbing and the public water supply. Irrigation systems not protected by approved backflow prevention devices endanger the health of a household, neighborhood, and community.

All irrigation systems – new or existing – must be equipped with an

Oregon Health Services-approved backflow prevention device. Only properly installed, state-approved backflow prevention devices meet the plumbing code and provide protection for the health of your family and neighbors.

Three of the four types of backflow prevention devices require annual testing to make sure they are working properly. Now is an excellent time to schedule that annual backflow assembly test. Tuesday – Thursday 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.



Cultural Programming


We offer a wide range of cultural programming, from music to lecture, demonstrations to dance. You won't want to miss a single one.

ODOT Highway 99E Project

A project to correct a rock fall-prone basalt cliff, paralleling Oregon Highway 99E at the south city limits of Oregon City, is scheduled for bid later this year, with actual work beginning September 2003. The rock fall conditions have been problematic for some time; however, a recent fire has increased the incidents of falling rock. This may require work to begin sooner.

Removing unstable rock from the cliff's face requires intermittent highway closures. To mitigate this impact, Oregon Department of Transportation's (ODOT's) contractor will perform rock removal activities during night and early morning hours, for no more than three consecutive nights. This work will create noise levels above ambient conditions.

There are no nearby residential receptors in direct line of sight within 500 feet of the work. This

means the work will be heard but only at a moderate decibel level. It will be less for residences on the other side of the Willamette River.

Daytime activities will require limited highway closures as equipment and materials are moved in and out of the work area.

During the three-week project, Oregon Highway 99E will be reduced to one lane in each direction. Flaggers will be present while work is under way.

Prior to construction, ODOT will communicate project information and impacts to the local media, emergency/police services and the Canemah Neighborhood Association. The City of West Linn will also receive a copy of ODOT's news releases. For additional information contact ODOT at 503-731-8200.



ATM Safety

Automatic Teller Machines (ATM's) have increased the public's ability to conduct their banking business during non-traditional hours. While ATM's have certainly increased customer's convenience, they are also convenient to criminals looking for an easy opportunity. These tips from the Oregon City Police Department can decrease your chances of being a victim when using an ATM.

- Utilize an ATM located inside an open business, whenever possible.

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- Avoid using street ATM's during nighttime hours.
- Always be aware of suspicious persons or vehicles in the area of the ATM. Trust your feelings. If things don't feel right, avoid that machine.
- Have your card out of your wallet or purse before approaching the ATM.
- Don't write your ATM personal identification number (PIN) on your card or keep the number in your wallet.
- When entering your PIN, try to keep the numbers from being seen by others.
- Don't withdraw large amounts of cash.
- Secure your money at the ATM. Don't walk away with money in hand.
- Always take your receipt with you.
- If a robber demands your money, don't argue or fight with the suspect. Note the robber's description and give the robber the money.
- Get away as soon as it is safe to do so. Remember, the money is not worth getting hurt over.
- Report all robberies to the police as soon as possible by calling 911.

Want more information about water and water conservation?

South Fork Water Board, Oregon City and West Linn's water provider, has a number of free water source and conservation presentations and talks available to local groups and associations. Presentations vary from 10 – 15 minutes talks, to hour-long workshops, depending on the needs of the group. Below is a list of presentations that are available:

From the Faucet to the Tap ~ Where does our water come from when we turn on the tap? How does the water get to your house? How do we keep it safe to drink? Why is conservation important? Learn more about the water you drink.

Saving Water Make Cents ~ With the abundance of rainfall we get in the Pacific Northwest it is sometimes difficult to understand why we need to conserve water. This presentation will explain why conservation is important, and what you can do to save water both indoors and outdoors. Learn how you can cut your water use – and your water bill.

- *Learning How to Find and Fix Leaks* ~ This hands-on presentation will show you how you can use your water meter to check for leaks, and how easy it is to repair leaky faucets and leaky toilets. Those little leaks can really add up.
- *Water-Wise Landscaping Slide Show* ~ During the summer months we use a lot of water outdoors. Water-wise landscaping uses simple, common sense gardening practices that can help you create a beautiful yard while using less water. This slide show covers the seven basic steps of water wise landscaping so that you can achieve a water efficient landscape.
- *Developing a Water-Wise Lawn* ~ Nearly 30% of the water used in a single-family residence is used in the summer to water lawns. This slide show will explain how a properly installed and maintained lawn can be kept green and healthy with the appropriate amount of resources – fertilizer, water, and your time.
- *Cadillac Desert* ~ This four-part PBS video series provides insight into the history of the politics of water. Each video is about one-hour long, and can be seen individually, or as part of the series. The first three videos are based on Marc Reisner's book "Cadillac Desert", and examine how water created the modern American West. The fourth video is based on the book "Last Oasis" by Sandra Postel, and looks at water demands and the need for water conservation.
