## Library Music Performances Continue

Each year the Mayor and City Commission present the Jon E. Storm award to an outstanding individual and business for their exceptional contribution to the City's Enhancement and Cleanup event. This was the fourteenth year that citizens have gathered together to beautify Oregon City.

The Individual Award went to Larry Falleur of Falleur Pressure Washing. The Business Award was presented to B&B Leasing and received by owner Dick Bloom. Certificates were also presented to volunteers whose efforts resulted in the collection of tons of garbage, debris, recyclable materials and 400 tires.

## Urban Renewal Agency Positions Open

The City of Oregon City has positions open for the proposed expansion of the Urban Renewal Agency. The Urban Renewal Agency oversees disbursement of funds collected within the City's two Urban Renewal Districts (Downtown and Hilltop). Currently the Agency is made of the Mayor and four City Commissioners. The City is looking to expand the agency with four additional members. They include an individual residing or doing business within the Downtown Urban Renewal District, another individual residing or doing business within the Hilltop Urban Renewal District, one representing the Chamber of Commerce and one member-at-large. ## O.C. Juvenile Diversion Panel

The Oregon City Police Department, in partnership with the Clackamas County Juvenile Department, has just completed the first full fiscal year of the Oregon City Juvenile Diversion Panel. The panel in Oregon City is coordinated by Mr. Nate Wallbaum and is funded through the Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant. The police department has been informed that the panel will again be funded through this grant for the fiscal year 2001/2002 in the amount of \$24,689.50.

Oregon City has a total of ten citizen volunteers divided into two panels consisting of five members each. These panels meet separately once a month to hear cases referred to them from the Clackamas County Juvenile Department. Cases that are referred are those where a juvenile, who is a resident of Oregon City, has committed an offense.

Offenses include Status Offenses, such as curfew or runaway violations. They also include law violations, such as Minor in possession of alcohol or possession of less than one ounce of marijuana.

Some Misdemeanor crimes are also referred and include: Criminal Mischief in the third degree; Theft in the third degree; Theft of services under \$50; Disorderly Conduct; Carrying a concealed weapon (other than a gun); Harassment; Theft in the second degree; and giving false information to a police officer.

In the fiscal year of July 1, 2000 to June

30, 2001, the Oregon City Diversion Panel received 140 referrals from the Juvenile Department. A total of 57 youths have successfully completed their Diversion contract with panel members in Oregon City. There have been 22 cases returned to the Juvenile Department because the youths failed to complete their obligations. The remaining 61 youths have cases which are pending completion. Of the 140 youth referred to the Oregon City panel, only ten have committed new offenses.

The total time the citizens panel members in Oregon City have volunteered during the past twelve months exceeded 240 hours. A total of 390 hours of community service to be performed in Oregon City has been assigned to those youthful offenders.



## Winter Weather Preparation Tips

Are you prepared for winter? It is important to have a plan and a disaster preparedness kit ready for any extreme weather conditions such as winter storms or floods.

### What to do before a winter storm:

1. Gather emergency supplies into a disaster preparedness kit. Kits should contain water, food, blankets, flashlights, spare batteries and a first aid kit.
2. Make sure you have sufficient heating fuel since regular fuel sources may be cut off.
3. Keep emergency heating equipment on hand and have extra fire extinguishers available. (Make sure your family knows how to use them. Call 503-657-1365 for more information on extinguisher classes.)

### What to do during a winter storm:

1. Listen to the radio or television for weather reports and emergency information.
2. Dress for the season by wearing several layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing rather than one layer of heavy clothing. The outer garments should be

tightly woven and water repellant. Always wear a hat and try to cover your mouth with a scarf to protect your lungs from the cold air, and remember that mittens are warmer than gloves.

3. Be careful when shoveling snow. Overexertion can bring on a heart attack – a major cause of death during the winter. If you must shovel snow, do some stretches beforehand.

## Water Quality News


The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has directed all water suppliers to work towards educating water consumers about the sources and quality of their drinking water. The rationale for the distribution of our annual Water Quality Report is that consumers have the right to know what is in their drinking water and where that water comes from. The annual report lists the levels of any detected contaminants and how our water complies with drinking water rules for the previous calendar year.

If you are interested in additional information about our water source, the Clackamas River, there is a new U.S. Geological Survey website that carries real-time water quality data. <http://oregon.usgs.gov/clackamas/monitors/> will allow you to view 7-day, 14-day, or 30-day graphs of monitoring parameters such as temperature, turbidity, dissolved oxygen, pH, and stage (feet).

For additional watershed data collected monthly by South Fork Water Board, go to their website at [www.sfwb.com](http://www.sfwb.com) and click on Clackamas River Watershed Water Quality Data. You can view data from ten sampling sites for the years 2000 and 2001.

For a history of all our sampling data as reported to the Oregon Health Division, go to <http://159.121.24.16/> and click on "name look up". Type in Oregon City and it will link you to our Public Water System ID number. Click on the number and the page for Oregon City - South Fork will appear. At the bottom of the page you can select areas to view sampling results.

## Low Flow Fixtures

You can save a lot of water and energy with water saving fixtures and appliances. Below are just a few things to look for.

### Showerheads

The shower accounts for approximately 20% of indoor water use, and 40% to 50% of hot water use. Studies have shown that most people use 4 to 5 gallons of water a minute

when they shower. Some showerheads can flow at a higher rate of up to 8 gallons per minute.

You can continue to enjoy an invigorating shower, and still save water and energy in your shower by replacing a high-flow showerhead with a new low-flow showerhead. These low-flow showerheads are designed to maintain a refreshing spray and operate within a range of 1.5 to 2.5 gallons of water for each minute. Low-flow showerheads increase the shower force by increasing the velocity while dispersing the water into many tiny droplets that still give you an invigorating shower with less water.

There are several models available some equipped with a shut off button or handle that allow you to take a navy shower, so it should be possible to find a model that suit you. Because your shower uses more hot water than any other fixture or appliance, low-flow showerheads will reduce your hot water cost dramatically. So not only will you save money on your water bill but you will save money on your energy bill as well.

### Faucet Aerators

Older faucets typically use 7 gallons per minute and new faucets use about 3.5 gallons per minute. These kitchen and bathroom faucets can be replaced with low flow faucet aerators, which are available in sizes ranging from .5 to 2.5 gallon per minute. These aerators mix air with the water to make an effective spray pattern. By replacing old aerators with a new more efficient one you can save a lot of water.

### Low Flow Toilets

If you have an older toilet, you could be using up to 40% of you indoor water use on toilet flushing. Older toilets can use anywhere from 3.5 to 7 gallons per flush. New Ultra Low Flow Toilets (ULFT) are a proven technology and only use 1.6 gallons per flush. Most models work very well, with no special problems. Consumer Reports February 1995 issue has an excellent comparison of many different models of Ultra Low Flow Toilets.

### Horizontal-axis Washing Machines

A typical household does nearly 400 loads of laundry a year, using about 40 gallons per full load with a conventional washer. In contrast, new horizontal-axis washing machines only use 20 -25 gallons per load. These new washing machine are different in that instead of filling the entire tub with water and agitating the clothes covered with water, the new, water efficient machines are front loading and fill the tub only partially full and rotate the clothes

through the water. These water efficient clothes washers not only use 1/3 the amount of water as conventional washers, but also 1/2 of the energy. Therefore, you can save money by using less water, less detergent and less energy. These new washing machines are made by a number of different manufactures and are carried by appliance retailers nationwide.

Also look for the State of Oregon Residential Energy Tax Credit program. Qualified washing machines will result in a tax credit of \$120 to \$210, depending on the model.
