

Water Quality News

With the end of daylight savings time, winter will be here soon. It seems like a good time to remind customers how to prepare for emergency situations. In the event of a prolonged power outage, or a disaster such as an earthquake, water service may be disrupted or water rationing imposed. Be prepared by ensuring that you and your family have an ample supply of clean water. A recommended amount is one gallon per person per day for 12 days.

Bottled drinking water should be stored out of direct sunlight, away from chemicals that could permeate the container, and protected from freezing. Commercially bottled water can be stored for one year. Tap water that is kept in safe containers can be stored for six months before being replaced. It is best to buy approved water jugs or use well-washed, plastic soda bottles. It is not recommended to use empty bleach, detergent, or milk jugs.

If unsure about the safety of water, there are two easy ways to purify water

that is to be used for drinking, food preparation, or hygiene. One is to bring water to a rolling boil for three to five minutes. Let the water cool before use. The second method is to disinfect with household liquid bleach that contains 5.25 percent sodium hypochlorite. (Never use scented bleaches, color safe bleaches, or bleaches with added cleaners). For each gallon of water add 16 drops of bleach. Stir the water and let it stand for 30 minutes. If the water does not have a slight bleach odor, repeat the dosage and let it stand for an additional 15 minutes.

Remember, the Carnegie is full of hand-made gifts, created by many of the areas finest artists.


16th Annual Cleanup and Enhancement Event


Adult Yoga Classes

TVF&R's Contract Expires July 1, 2003

Since 1999, Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue (TVF&R) has provided fire protection and emergency medical services to the City of Oregon City on a contract basis. During this time, the Fire District has enhanced the level of service to the citizens of Oregon City. TVF&R has provided improvements in emergency response capabilities, equipment and facilities, specialty rescue teams (hazardous materials, water rescue and technical rescue), emergency management planning and fire inspections.

With one year remaining in the contract period, TVF&R recently decided not to pursue an extension of

the contract. This decision came following the city's decision to build a third fire station, increasing operational costs approximately \$1 million per year. The City's desire to add a third fire station would have forced TVF&R to either increase the cost of a future contract or subsidize (use taxpayer funds outside of Oregon City to offset the increase in cost). The City of Oregon City is currently not in a financial position to incur such costs.

For some time, the City of Oregon City and Clackamas County Fire District #1 (CCFD#1) have been discussing the possibility of CCFD#1 providing service to the city after the TVF&R contract expires. At the October 2nd Commission meeting, the City of Oregon City and CCFD#1 signed a ten-year contract to provide the city with fire protection and emergency medical services. Unlike Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue, CCFD#1 borders and surrounds much of Oregon City. Due to this geographical advantage, CCFD#1 can achieve economies not available to TVF&R.

Until the contract concludes, Oregon City citizens will continue to receive excellent service from Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue, whose first priority is the citizens they protect. A transition team, comprised of representatives from all aspects of operation including finance, facilities, human resources, fire prevention and community services, are working to ensure a seamless transition of providers.

Saving Water Indoors

The following are everyday tips and ideas about how you and your family can use water more efficiently in and around your home. (*Savings are based on a family of four.)

- Take a shallow bath instead of a shower. (Saves 15-20 gallons per day). If you take a shower, make it quick, install a shower timer.

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- Don't flush tissues and cigarettes. (Saves 400-600 gallons per month).
- Turn off the water while brushing your teeth. (Saves 3 gallons per day).
- Use a waterless hand cleaner when washing greasy hands, and don't let the water run. (Saves 7-10 gallons per day).
- Rinse razors with short blast or by swishing it in a partially filled sink. (Saves 3 gallons per week).
- Save the shower water used while waiting for the water to get hot in a bucket for house plants. (Saves 100-300 gallons per month).
- Run only full loads in the washing machine and dishwasher. (Saves 75-200 gallons per week).
- Keep a bottle of cold water in the refrigerator for drinking instead of running the faucet. (Saves 200-300 gallons per month).
- Defrost frozen food without running water over the packages. (Saves 50-250 gallons per month).
- Rinse vegetables in a filled sink instead of running water. (Saves 150-250 gallons per month).
- Use the garbage disposal less and the garbage more. (Saves 50-150 gallons per month).
- Wash dishes with the least amount of detergent possible, minimizing rinsing. (Saves 50-150 gallons per month).
- If you don't want water in a restaurant, don't take it. You will save the water in the glass and the water used to wash the glass. (Collectively saves millions of gallons per year).



Be Involved in Enhancements to McLoughlin Blvd.

The City has been awarded a grant from ODOT to refine the plan for McLoughlin Boulevard (Highway 99E) to fit into our Waterfront Master Plan and the Downtown Community Plan. These important documents both resulted from thoughtful community planning for downtown Oregon City. Before any construction projects can be designed, more detailed plans must be developed for the corridor. We will kick off this effort this fall, and will need input from the community, to develop a plan that makes sense for the corridor.

Pedestrian Crossings

Did you know that motorists are required to *YIELD* to pedestrians, in a properly striped and signed pedestrian crossing, at a non-signalized intersection? State law provides protection for pedestrians within demarcated crosswalks. The pedestrian has the right-of-way within a marked crosswalk with no traffic signal. If the crosswalk is part of a signalized intersection, the pedestrian has the right-of-way only when the "walk" signal is activated. However, please note that if a pedestrian is outside the boundaries of a controlled crosswalk, they are responsible for *THEIR OWN* safety. Regardless of specific laws, pedestrians should always exercise caution when approaching a

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roadway. Entering a crosswalk should be done *AFTER* stopping, looking, and listening – checking for other traffic and risks. *PLEASE ALWAYS REMEMBER*: a pedestrian can stop much faster than a moving vehicle!!

McLoughlin Boulevard/South 2nd /Tumwater ODOT Project

Thank you, motorists, for your patience throughout the highway realignment and signalization project on McLoughlin Boulevard (Highway 99E) at South 2nd. This ODOT project should be finalized this fall when the new traffic signals arrive. ODOT prioritized funding for this project because of a high accident rate.

Before final design occurred for the intersection, ODOT studied many alternatives for the improvements. Numerous constraints led to the selected project. Tumwater will be permanently closed to traffic entering McLoughlin Boulevard, because the basalt bluff creates unacceptable site distance when compared to highway standards. Additional lanes would have provided more capacity at the intersection, but were not feasible because of the location of the museum and railroad tracks and the rock conditions.

The signalized intersection will provide a much higher level of safety for users, but additional congestion can be expected because of controlled intersection movements. McLoughlin Boulevard traffic will no longer have a continuous free movement at South 2nd. After the project is complete, the City will endeavor to work with ODOT to monitor the local impacts of the improvements.

New Light Bulbs for Traffic Signals

The Public Works Street Division has found a way to save more energy and resources for you! This summer Public Works began a program of getting our traffic signal heads updated from the old incandescent light bulbs (67-135 watt) to the new (9-15 watt) LED (light emitting diode) bulbs.

The old bulbs required annual replacement. The new LED lights are more expensive to purchase initially, but only need to be replaced every 5 to 7 years or more, with an energy consumption reduction expected to be at least 70%.

This year, we were approved for an \$8,940.00 rebate on the \$19,069.00 cost of the green lights from the Energy Trust of Oregon. The new lights will be installed by December 20th. Next year, we hope to expand the program with additional replacements for yellows and pedestrian heads.

Road Construction Update

Summer 2002 construction has wrapped up on many projects. Thank you for your patience and cooperation. Several projects will continue into fall and winter. Please use caution in construction zones, as rainy weather reduces visibility and creates slick pavements. Most projects with permanent paving will need to be buttoned up before regular winter rains begin. Some paving will need to be carried forward to next spring. Contractors for City projects are required to maintain construction zones for safe access.
