School's Are Back in Session

The Oregon City Police Department wants to remind you that it is September, and that means a significant increase in vehicular and pedestrian traffic around our schools. Motorists should be alert for children walking, and riding bicycles, to and from schools and bus stops. Since over 25,000 child pedestrians are injured each year by motor vehicles, it is important to remember some basic safety tips.

The simplest way for motorists to avoid a tragedy is to slow down and be alert. Obey the posted speed limits in school zones, whenever children might be present. Extracurricular activities mean children will be

traveling in school zones from early morning, to well into the evening hours. Motorists should expect children to occasionally walk, or pedal, into unsafe areas, so they need to be especially cautious when driving in areas frequented by children.



Parents can increase their children's safety, while walking or bicycling to and from school, by teaching them some basic safety skills: looking left, right, and then left again before attempting to cross a street; stopping at the edge of parked cars before attempting to cross; crossing the street only when it is clear of vehicles, while continuing to look left and right when crossing. Children should only cross the street at marked crossings and always obey traffic signals, crossing guards, or police officers. Explaining and practicing these skills with your children will significantly enhance their ability to travel to and from school in a safe manner.

Remember, as adults we have the responsibility to be alert and avoid injuring children. Children are vulnerable and quite often do not understand complex traffic situations, so be aware of your surroundings, slow down, and have a safe school year.

How Does Our Community Grow?

You are invited to a second public Open House and Workshop on Thursday, September 26th, for the Oregon City Comprehensive Plan. Participants will review, and provide input on updated elements of the Plan. The Open House will be held at the Oregon City High School—Moss Campus, 19761 S. Beaver Creek Road from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m., with a presentation at 5:30 p.m. and repeated at 6:45 p.m. Children are welcome to attend.

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The Oregon City Comprehensive Plan is 20 years old and needs updating. In that time, Oregon City has grown dramatically, and more people, new commercial development, and environmental concerns have influenced the shape of the city. The Comprehensive Plan provides the guiding framework for development within the City, as it relates to transportation, housing, employment, infrastructure and the environment. Some parts of the plan, such as transportation, have been updated recently, but the elements being addressed during this process have not been fully updated since 1982.

In April 2002, City staff began updating the 1982 Comprehensive Plan, with assistance from the Comprehensive Plan Technical Advisory Committee (CTAC). The CTAC includes representatives of neighborhood associations, local businesses, affordable housing advocates, the development community, the school district, Metro, environmental organizations, and the Planning Commission.

At the September 26th Open House, we will present information on housing and employment conditions in the City, and proposed changes to the Comprehensive Plan to accommodate future growth, including a proposed new Accessory Dwelling Unit ordinance. New master plans for water and sanitary sewer services (see the following) will also be presented for comment; they are ancillary documents to the Comprehensive Plan. The work that has been done to date on both the water and sewer master plans will be available for your review at the open house. Other topics will include transportation, natural resources and public facilities.

Updating the Water Distribution System Master Plan

As part of the Comprehensive Plan Update process, the City is developing a new master plan for the water distribution system. The purpose of the master plan is to thoroughly examine the state of the water distribution system, plan for necessary improvements, and to provide high quality water service for the community, under existing and future conditions.

City planners have looked at water demand patterns for the community. They are now interviewing the staff responsible for operating the system and using computer modeling to help identify deficiencies with respect to the City's service standards. Computer modeling will also be used to evaluate the system under future conditions. Other work includes: a seismic vulnerability assessment; analysis of storage and pumping capacities; and operational issues such as routine maintenance requirements and coordination of facilities shared with other agencies.

The recommended improvement projects for the water distribution system will be organized into a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). The CIP identifies the scope, estimated cost, and projected timing for each project. Based on the CIP, the master plan will present alternative financing methods, and evaluate the rate impacts associated with each method. Once a preferred financing program is selected, implementation recommendations will be provided for both the capital improvements and any necessary operational adjustments. This work will be presented to the City Commission and public for comment. Following final reviews, the City will formally adopt the master plan.

Updating the Sanitary Sewer Master Plan

The Sanitary Sewer Master Plan is another part of the Oregon City Comprehensive Plan. The last sanitary sewer master plan was completed in 1989. Since then, the City has experienced population growth of more than 50% and has implemented significant sewer system improvements to address that growth. Sewer service has been extended to over 34 additional subdivisions, and many capital projects have been undertaken, including projects to separate sewage flows and storm water flows that previously were conveyed together in combined sewers. In addition, new pipes are still needed where recent annexations have occurred.

Because of the changes since the last master plan, an update is needed to fully document and evaluate the City's current sewer system for today and over the next 20 years. This work involves assessing existing and future wastewater flows and system capacity, and identifying improvements. A Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) will also need to be prepared.

Sanitary sewer flow monitoring was conducted through the wet weather period beginning in January and ending in March 2002. Based upon preliminary review of the flow results, and hydraulic analysis of the collection system, Oregon City's sanitary sewer system is in relatively good condition, with few instances of capacity related problems.

Fire Prevention and Safety Fair



On September 28th, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Danielson's Fresh Marketplace in Oregon City, 1500 Molalla Avenue, will host the annual Fire Prevention and Safety Fair. The fair, which is going on its 19th year, has several top-notch attractions including: Life Flight; and extrication demonstrations by Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue's Technical Rescue Team. Of course, the Fire Safety House will be on site to teach kids and parents how to get out of the house safely in case of a fire.

The fair is part of Fire Prevention Week (Oct. 7-12), which was inspired by one of the worst fires in America's history – the great Chicago Fire of October 9, 1871. The fire claimed more than 250 lives and destroyed 17,430 buildings. In 1911, on the 40th anniversary of the Chicago Fire, the Fire Marshals Association of North America proclaimed the nation's first Fire Prevention Day to promote public awareness of fire safety.

In addition to taking tours of the fire safety house, and watching exciting demonstrations by local emergency agencies, there will be several activities for kids. They will be able to knock down cones with a hose line, ride in an antique fire engine, visit with Ponchanello the Clown and Smokey Bear, eat free Alpenrose ice cream, and learn how to be safe from local companies such as PGE and NW Natural Gas. Local Danielson Hilltop Mall merchants will also be awarding prizes to kids who participate in fun learning exercises.

Fall Heritage Fair

On Saturday, September 14th, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., celebrate the heritage of one of the earliest settlements and first cities of the Oregon Territory. Enjoy period music, children's games, food, historic craft demonstrations, and more. Activities are free and will take place in the Historic McLoughlin Neighborhood between John Adams and Washington Streets on 10th Street. - Indoor Playground (Ages 5 and under) ~ The indoor playground will promote a safe and cooperative environment for playtime

between children and their parents, while encouraging the development of large motor skills. Children will also gain experience with group interaction and cooperative play. 
Water Quality News

One way to optimize water quality in the distribution system is periodically flush the water mains. Oregon City Water Division will continue its Water Main Flushing Program sometime after Labor Day, when temperatures and water use begin to drop.

Our flushing program provides several important benefits. Forcing water to move through the water mains, and out the fire hydrants, helps to scour out any sediment that may have collected over time in the water system. Where dead-end mains exist, flushing replaces stale water with fresher water that has higher disinfectant levels. Flowing through fire hydrant during flushing allows staff to spot potential problems with hydrant operation. Repairs can be made to ensure all hydrants will be available if needed. While flushing, staff can find and repair malfunctioning valves or other water system problems before they become major problems.

During the flushing process, there is the possibility that accumulated sediment inside the water mains may be stirred up, causing discoloration of the water. You can help keep this discolored water out of your private system. While employees are flushing the water mains in your area, we recommend that you do not run water in your home or business, or operate appliances that use water. You will be notified before any flushing activity begins in your neighborhood.

We're prepared to entertain and educate you this fall with a great lineup of cultural programs. Here's what's scheduled for September:



Water Conservation with Ornamental Grasses

Over the ages, grasses have
provided food and shelter, through-
out the world. Now, using grass as
ornamental landscaping is gaining
popularity. Most ornamental grasses
are drought tolerant and ideal for
water conserving landscapes.
Throughout the growing season,
their changing color, size and form
provide landscapes with color and
texture. One of the most effective
ways to use grasses is by recreating
or imitating a natural grassland.
Group grasses with trees, shrubs,
and other perennials to create this
look. Observing nature's arrange-
ment of plants, and visiting estab-
lished gardens, can provide inspira-
tion and ideas for plant setting.

- Choosing ornamental grasses –
Ornamental grasses make good
ground cover or background
plants. They can soften
hardscapes, such as sidewalks
and retaining walls, and provide

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privacy and wind protection. Grasses can grow in wet soils or dry soils, in full sun or part shade. They have attractive and long-lasting cut flowers, which can last for years.

- Watering needs – Adequate watering when first planted, and until established, is recommended. Once established, ornamental grasses require only occasional watering after extended hot, dry spells. Some field-grown ornamental grasses in this region are thriving after going through five consecutive dry summers without irrigation.

There are many new and interesting ornamental grasses available in the Northwest. Take time to evaluate your landscape needs and choose the appropriate grasses. Ornamental grasses are versatile and useful, and provide exciting textures and colors to landscapes. They combine beauty with function and help conserve natural resources.
