<p>This one story bungalow has a rectangular plan and sits on a concrete foundation with basement. The jerkinhead roof is covered in composition shingles with diminutive eave returns. A chimney rises from the center of the roof. The house is covered in wood shingles. Windows are primarily 6/1 wood double-hung and 1/1 wood double-hung with decorative shutters on the front façade. A small porch at the main entrance is covered with a gable roof. The kitchen retains its cold cupboard vents on the exterior.</p> <p>A period garage sits to the north of the house and has a new door.</p>
